Introduction

This document contains historic addresses of our Filipek and Nemec ancestors and is available on *Our Filipek Family Web Pages* as part of our Filipek family history. This listing is restricted to deceased families or members of our Filipek and Nemec family lines.

For ease of use, the above <u>*Table of Contents*</u> includes active links along with a simplified genealogy chart to assist in selecting items of interest. Merely touch the line or page number to move to a section of interest.

Following are *Historical Filipek Family Addresses* for two family surnames that led to our current Jordans all of whom are part of *The Filipek Story*. These *Addresses* begin with the Antonin and Katerina Filipek Family of Kolence, Bohemia and include some of their descendants. After the Filipek addresses, the Martin and Katerina Nemec Family of Bohemia is listed. One branch of each family led to our Filipeks of Chicago and later our Jordans of Chicago.

The key families are:

- 1. The Filipek Family
- 2. The Nemec Family

Addresses were obtained from a number of sources including but not limited to *Baptism Records*, *Marriage Records*, *Census Records*, *and Death Records*, *and City Directories*. The resulting *Address Records* listing thus represents a chronology that show when and where various events took place during the lives of our ancestors.

The *Address Lists* are organized around families and thus the various records that are indexed in the above *Table of Contents* are titled by either the name of a family (husband and wife) or an individual if unmarried including widow, widower. Addresses for husband and wife before marriage can be found with their parents. Included also is a section which provides descriptions and locations of the various cities and neighborhoods associated with our ancestors.

Spellings of names and places vary for different records and sometimes individuals changed some part of their names or used nicknames or abbreviations. In the transcriptions that follows, the names are transcribed as they were recorded in the original record source.

In order to help preserve our family history and to make that history more widely available, *Our Filipek Family Web Pages* was created in the early years of the 21st century.

While quite successful in its goals, it became clear with the passage of time, that a web site with many hundreds of pages was not easy to print or to electronically download. Thus in the later part of the first decade of the 21st century, I began to compile various categories of information such as *Filipek Family Addresses*, *Filipek Family Census Records*, *Filipek Genealogy Source Records*, and the Filipek Stories into pdf documents.

Such pdf files will make it easier to download files for preservation on our many computers and they will also allow much easier printing of pages and for studied analysis as desired. As part of this effort, a *Filipek and Nemec PDF Downloads* web page was created. From this page, all currently available pdf's from *Our Filipek Family Web Pages* and *Our Nemec Family Web Pages* can be accessed.

You are encouraged to download the various Filipek and Nemec pdf files, not only for your own study but to also help preserve for future generations hard to obtain data and information about our common Filipek, Nemec and Jordan origins and history. Files are updated every once in a while, and checking about once a year is a reasonable frequency. Version dates are shown at the beginning of the <u>Table of Contents</u>.

You may have noted that the current document is quite lengthy and contains information for not only the Filipeks but also the Nemecs, and Sokoliks. While it might have made sense to focus this document on one family or a family line with the same surname, my worry was that there would have been a proliferation of pdf files. Many scattered files and associated updates would make it harder to find and save all the related and connected information. Thus all have been placed within the current file.

Notes

 Tomas Filipek and Marie Ann Jirakova were married 24 November 1776 in Kolence; their children are listed in the genealogy above. Marie Ann Jirakova Filipek died in the 1780s and Tomas Filipek then married Anna Forst on 8 October 1786. The genealogy from his second marriage has been developed by John and Debbie Shuck. Their tree can be seen on *Rootsweb World Connect Project*. Select *Family Trees*, then enter *Filipek* as the Surname and *Tomas* as the Given Name. Select the *Tomas* with a birth year of 1752.

- 2. All eight Antonin and Katerina Filipek children were born at Farm No.16, Kolence, Bohemia, Czechoslovakia. It was then known as the Filipek Family Farm.
- 3. James F. Filipek came to Chicago in 1911 with Uncle Vaclav Filipek. He became known in Chicago as *Jim the Gardener* because of his work as horticulturalist. He was also known as *Big Jim* because he was much taller than his cousin Jim (James A. Filipek).
- 4. All births for the Jan and Franceska Filipek children were in Minnesota.
- 5. It is unclear whether the original name in Bohemia was Jana or Janu. There is some information suggesting the original family name was Janu, but to date no genealogy record from Czechoslovakia has been obtained to verify this. Most references to the family in the United States use Jana, Janna or Yanna. Since the earliest known use is Jana and is consistent in early records, Jana will be used throughout these pages. It should be noted however that various phonetic spellings such as Gunia, Yana, and Yanna and have been found in numerous records by BH. It appears the extended family evolved over time to the consistent use of Yanna. Perhaps this is because Americans would pronounce Yanna correctly to their ear, but would pronounce Jana with the "J" sound.

Early Vaclav Filipek Locations

- 1. Vaclav Filipek was born and raised on Farm No. 16 in Kolence. He is thought to have attended Argronmic School in Hracholuskach. Agronomics is the application of the various soil and plant sciences to soil management and the raising of crops.
- 2. Vaclav Filipek brought his agronomics journal with him to the United States. His son, John, preserved it and John's granddaughter, Terry, had it rebound. The journal is written in Czech in a beautiful script and will be translated over the years.
- 3. Vaclav Filipek's immigration date into the USA ranges from 1882 to 1889. There is some evidence that he may have first arrived around 1882 or 1883 and then returned to Bohemia and then re-entered the USA in 1889.

- 1. The Dedina Address listing was created because Marie Dedina was the baptismal sponsor for Mary Filipek in 1889 and Vojtech (Albert) was the baptismal sponsor for James A. Filipek in 1892. This was a new surname in our research but usually baptismal sponsors are relatives or very close friends.
- 2. The Chicago Directories show Albert Dedina at 187 24th Place from at least 1883 to at least 1904.
- 3. James and Katherine Filipek lived at 187 24th Place address from 1892-1894 and were thus likely close friends.

- 4. The 1883 Dedina address at 187 24th Place was next door to John Novak. John and Theresa Novak were the baptismal sponsors for John Filipek in December 1882.
- 5. These early addresses and dates are of special interest because there is a story that Katherine arrived in 1882 and stayed with friends or relatives. It now appears likely that the Novaks and Dedinas are those friends or relatives.
- 6. According to the 1900 Census, the Dedinas immigrated to the USA in 1873.

- 1. The Novak Address listing was created because John and Theresa Novak were the baptismal sponsors for John Filipek in December 1882. In addition, Mary Novak, relation unknown, married Frank Nemec in 1891. Frank Nemec was Katherine's brother. Novak was a new surname in our research but usually baptismal sponsors are relatives or very close friends.
- 2. The 1883 John Novak address at 185 24th Place is next door to the one for Albert Dedina.
- 3. The Dedinas are of interest because Marie Dedina was the baptismal sponsor for Mary Filipek in 1889 and Albert Dedina was the baptismal sponsor for James Albert Filipek in 1892.
- 4. These early addresses and dates are of special interest because there is a story that Katherine arrived in 1882 and stayed with friends or

relatives. It now appears likely that the Novaks and Dedinas are those friends or relatives.

- 5. It is probable that Katerina Nemec stayed with the Novaks when she arrived July 1882 and pregnant with son John. No relation, such as cousins has been established between the Nemecs and the Novaks, but it is likely there is given Katerina travel thousands of miles to stay with them.
- 6. Because John Novak is such a common name and his occupation in 1883 was listed as laborer, it is very difficult to determine which, if any of the listed John Novaks are the John Novak of interest.
- 7. No other references to John and Theresa Novak other than the 1882 baptism of John Filipek have been found. It is not known whether they stayed a short while and went back to Bohemia or stayed.

City and Neighborhood Locations and Descriptions

As follows are descriptions and locations of various cities, towns, and neighborhoods in in Bohemia, Illinois and Colorado connected with the history of our Filipek, Nemec, and Sokolik families.

Bohemia

As follows are text descriptions of towns and locations in Bohemia, now Czechoslovakia related to our Filipek, Nemec, and Sokolik families. Most towns are about 60-80 miles south of Prague and about 20-35 miles from the Austrian border at Gmund. The area has a significant number of small lakes.

Ceske Budejovice

A larger town of about 100,000 just south of Mazelov. It is an important road center, railway hub, and river port and the origin of Budvar (Budweiser) beer. There must have been a significant German presence in this area at one time. The town has an inner historic town and a nearby castle. Note the "ice" sound is pronounced "tse". Budejovice is a major rail stop where trains can be obtained southeast to the Austrian border at Ceske Velenice with exchanges to Vienna thus providing a way that our Katherina Nemec could have traveled to Vienna to study cooking. Similarly trains can be taken north from Budejovice to Prague and then onto the major ports of Hamburg and Bremen where Katerina Nemec, Vaclav Filipek and other Filipeks and Sokoliks sailed to reach America. Katerina's brother Frantisek Nemec was born in Ceske Budejovice. Their parents Martin and Katerina Nemec lived in the city for a few short years in the late 1860s before moving to Lomnice.

Ceske Velenice

This small town of about 4000 is across the Luznice river from Austria and a gateway to enter or leave this portion of the country. It was part of the town of Gmund under the Austrian Empire. There is a railway center and it is about 26 miles southeast from Ceske Budejovice. Note the "ice" sound is pronounced "tse".

Frahelz

This town is about 1 mile north of Lomnice nad Luznici off of Route 150. Martin and Katerina Nemec lived here just after they were married. They had their first son, Tomas, here in 1850 but moved away within a few years.

Hracholuskach

This town is the location of the agronomics school Vaclav attended in 1884. It is about 20 miles west of Ceske Budejovice and about 40 miles from Kolence.

Klec

This town is about 1 mile northeast of Lomnice and just north of Route 148. It is the birthplace of Katerina Zelezny, mother of Katerina Nemec. It is about 2 km from Kolence.

Kolence

Kolence is the ancestral home of the Filipeks and the location of the long owned family farm. It is about 4 miles east of Lomnice on Route 148. It is about 70 miles southeast of Prague. There are two ponds in the center of town split by the main road.

The following contribution is from a contact there named Scot.

"As you drive into Kolence from Lomnice nad Luznici (about 6 km away) you're basically going west to east on the Highway 148 (the country road shown in the photo of Ted Curtis with his bike standing in front of the Kolence sign). There are about 15 houses lining the road as you come into town, then when you enter the center of the village there are large ponds on the north and south of the road with houses around them and near them. There's a paved lane that circles the north pond. About a dozen old farmhouses line the paved lane adjacent to the north pond. At the east end of the north pond (on the right if you're looking at the pond from Highway 148) there is a "Jednota," a chain of small co-op grocery stores popular during Communism. The Jednota faces north, toward the paved lane. Across the lane there's a small grassy square and across that, facing southwest back toward the lake and the Jednota is Farm No. 16. There are some old farmhouses on either side of it.

Farm No. 16 is a classic "usedlost" (Czech farm). These were usually built with the farm buildings forming a square with a large courtyard in the middle. Usually you have one or more buildings where the farmer lived at the front, where you normally see the entry gates (one for people, another for equipment). The sides and rear of the square are formed by the barn, stables, stys, workshops, etc. The garden and orchard is usually behind the rear barn, then the fields. There are some big working fields (mostly hay, some corn) immediately around Kolence. There's a dairy farm just behind (north of) the houses lining the north lake.

The old Sokolik Family Farm No. 9 is also located north of the lake facing south toward the lake and paved lane, about 3 - 4 houses west of No. 16 (within a two minute walk of No. 16). It's yellow and may be subdivided into two homes (a different number was on half of it). Its layout is basically the same but with a wider entrance area."

Lomnice nad Luznici

This town of about 2000 is on the Luznice River and is about 13 miles northeast of Ceske Budejovice and about 6 miles northwest of Trebon via Route 150. Lomnice is at the intersection of Routes 150 and 148. Lomnice is also less than 2 miles west of Kolence on Route 148 and less than a mile from Klec.

The Martin and Katerina Nemec family moved there about 1870 and remained the rest of their lives. Our Katerina Filipek (nee Nemec) was about 8 when she moved here with her parents. Thus she lived relatively near her future husband Vaclav Filipek of Kolence. Of note is that Lomnice is about 20 miles northwest of the Austrian border at Gmund/ Ceske Velenice via road, similar to the 20 miles that Jeanne Jordan remembered her Grandmother Katherine Filipek telling her. Rose Filipek (nee Skoblik) was also born in Lomnice in 1900. Lomnice is probably where Katherine Filipek and Rose Filipek both went back to over the years to visit relatives.

Mazelov

This town is about 6 miles west of Lomnice, via 148 and another road. It is also about 2.5 miles northeast on Route 3 from Ceske Budejorice and then east about .6 miles. This is the birthplace of Katerina Nemec in 1862. It is also the birthplace of her father Martin.

Novosedly Nad Nezarkou

This is the location of the parish church and the cemetery for the Filipeks . The town is about 1.5 miles east of Kolence on Route 148.

Sevetin

This town is about 1 mile east of Mazelov.

Stara Illina or Stara Hlina

This town is about 4 miles northeast of Trebon on Route 34. It is thought that this is where Mary Novak, wife of Frank Nemec was born.

Trebon

This town of about 10,000 is on a rail line and is about 13 miles northeast of Ceske Budejovice. The town has a brewery. This is where the registration records are located and is one of the larger towns near Kolence and Novosedly. It is located at the intersection of Route 34 and Route 150. Trebon is about 15-20 miles northwest of Ceske Velenice. Nearby Trebon is the CHKO Trebonsko nature preserve, part of the lake district and a bird habitat. The area is renowned for canoeing on the Luznice and Nezarkou rivers and also for biking.

Zablati

This town is a few miles northwest of Lomnice nad Luznici on Route 148. It is the birthplace of Vaclav Filipek's mother, Katerina Ceckova.

Illinois

Chicago and Riverside

James and Katherine Filipek settled in Chicago, Illinois in about 1889. Except for about 5 years from about 1895 to 1900, they lived at various locations between 24th and 30th Streets and between LaSalle and Emerald. Generally John and Theodore Sokolik were with them except that John stayed in Chicago when the Filipeks and his brother Theodore were in Colorado.

Around 1905 John Sokolik left the group and moved about 5 miles south to 6813 S. Emerald and shortly after that to a more permanent home at 6827 S. Union. This was the beginning of a trend to newer homes as that area was developed. Around 1911 Larry and Mary Barrett lived in at

7328 S. Union. After James died in 1914, Katherine and her sons joined Larry in this home.

Chicago Southtown

Chicago Mid-South Side

See <u>Chicago Mid-South Side Locations for Filipeks and Sokoliks</u> - includes Chicago Mid-South-Side map and addresses for the Filipeks and Sokoliks.

Riverside

Before 1920 Theodore and Louise Sokolik moved to Olmsted Road in Riverside. Later in 1920 or 1921, Katherine Filipek and her son John Filipek moved next door to Theodore in Riverside. Around 1925, James A. Filipek moved to Addison Road in Riverside. After John and Rose were married, Katherine moved to Burlington Road. Riverside is about 8 miles west of the old Filipek grocery store and had a strong Czech community at the time. It is believed that John Sokolik continued to live in Chicago for a while but then later moved to Riverside also.

Colorado

James and Katherine Filipek lived in Colorado from about 1895 to 1899 where they managed a crew laying track for the Denver and Rio Grande railroad. James was a foreman and Katherine was the cook for the rail crew. It is believed they were went to Pueblo initially but also lived in or near other towns as work required.

Dawkins

Dawkins was a small town established in 1885 about 10 miles north of Pueblo. In 1905 the town's post office moved to Pinon. Possibly the town has ceased to exist and may now be part of Pinon. On March 18th 1897 James Filipek wrote from Dawkins, Colorado and on December 23rd 1898 John James Filipek wrote to cousin John Sokolik in Chicago from here.

Pinon

Pinon is a small town established in 1885 about 10 miles north of Pueblo now near Interstate 25. On February 27th 1897 Katherine Filipek wrote from Pinon, Colorado.

Pueblo

Pueblo is about 100 miles south of Denver on Interstate 25. It was formed as a town in 1861 and is drained by the Arkansas and St. Charles Rivers. In the 1890s there was a period of rapid growth and five railroads converged there including the Denver and Rio Grande (D&RG); Texas and Fort Worth Chicago; Rock Island and Pacific; Atcheson, Topeka, and Santa Fe, and the Missouri Pacific. On January 28th 1896 James and Katherine Filipek were in #38 Block M, Pueblo, Colorado. The family has photographs of James and Katherine taken at 304 N. Main Street in Pueblo. Theodore Sokolik is listed in the Pueblo City Directory in 1897 as a laborer for the D&RG residing at the Old Union Depot and also in 1899 as a Fireman for the D&RGRR. Theodore is also mentioned in the December 23rd 1898 letter from John James Filipek as a fireman on a switch engine in Pueblo.

Minnesota

Three children of the Anton and Katherine Filipek Family settled in Minnesota in the 1870s and 1880s. These were Jan Filipek and his wife Franceska, Frantisek and Anna (nee Filipek) Sokolik, and Frantisek and Katerina (nee Filipek) Jana. Key towns of interest are Rush City, St. Paul, and Montgomery.

Montgomery

"Montgomery was founded in 1878 and is located about 10 miles south of New Prague and about 60 miles south of the Twin Cities. A Green Giant Factory was the main industry here for many years. Today's population is 2,399." [CFJ]

The Jan and Franceska Filipek family was listed in Montgomery for the 1870 and 1885 Censuses. The Sokolik and Jana families were listed in Montgomery for the 1880 Census.

New Prague

"New Prague, Minnesota was founded in 1877 and is located in Le Sueur and Scott Counties in South Central Minnesota about 50 miles south of the Twin Cities. It is about 10 miles north of Montgomery. A third town, Lonsdale is nearby and forms a triangle. Surrounded by farmland (corn, potatoes, beans, etc.) New Prague has also always been the more industrious of the three cities (Montgomery, Lonsdale, and New Prague) with a flour mill being the greatest. Today's population is at 3,560 and still a strong Czech Immigrant Community where Czech is spoken in some local businesses in all three of these towns." [CFJ]

Theodore Sokolik said he was born in New Prague but it is believed he was actually born in Bohemia in 1879. Most likely he didn't know for sure since he was only a few months old when he came. As mentioned above Theodore was listed in Montgomery during the 1880 Census and in Rush City during the 1885 Census. Perhaps the Sokoliks moved to New Prague and then north to Rush City and Theodore just remembered early years in New Prague.

Rush City

A small town of about 1500 in Chisago County about 50 miles north of St. Paul on the Rush River. It was settled before 1873 and is an agricultural area including grains, cattle, and dairy farming.

The Sokoliks and Janas families lived here during the 1885 Census. Rush City is also where Theodore Sokolik said in his story that he went to stay with his Aunt Katherine Jana (nee Filipek) after his mother died and where Katherine Jana died about 1890. This location is over 100 miles north of Montgomery where the Sokolik and Janas were in 1880 and where Jan Filipek continued to farm.


St. Paul

Now a large city of about 250,000 across the Mississippi River from Minneapolis. It was a major railway center after 1862.

This is where Theodore Sokolik said in his story that his mother Anna Sokolik (nee Filipek) died about 1886.

This is probably also the location Theodore Sokolik refers to as the small 4 room basement apartment. On July 7, 2001, the Filipek Tour Group drove down 25th Place which now dead ends going east. Unfortunately, 218 doesn't exist and there is just vacant land where it should be. Most of the houses on the street are newer, but there are a couple that could go back to the early 1890s. They generally are narrow and have a small front porch stoop. One can imagine the Filipeks sitting there on warm summer evenings.
James Filipek Home (1892-94)	187 24th Place	 187 24th Place was between LaSalle and Wentworth on the south side of 24th Place. This is the same location that the Dedinas lived in 1883 and probably continuously into the 1900s. It is possible the Filipeks and Dedinas shared different floors of a two or three story flat. Katherine Nemec probably also stayed near here in 1882. This location no longer exists. 24th Place ends at South Wentworth Avenue. It appears that a number of streets were eliminated and a new north south road was put where this location was. It is just south of I-55.
Original St. John Nepomucene Church	Northwest corner of 25th and Portland, now Princeton Ave. Princeton Avenue is 300 West.	 St. John Nepomucene began on Dec. 3, 1871 at the Northwest corner of 25th and Portland (now Princeton Ave). Princeton Avenue is 300 West. The Filipeks, Nemecs, Novaks and Dedinas would have attended this church. It was a few short blocks away from the above addresses. This church was a wooden structure built just before the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The church was moved to 2953 S. Lowe in May 1914. All the Filipek baptisms, communions, confirmations, Mary Filipek's wedding, and Vaclav's funeral mass took place here. The location no longer exists as it would be directly under I-55 at Princeton Avenue.
St. John Nepomucene	2953 S. Lowe	 2953 S. Lowe Avenue on the northeast corner of 30th and Lowe. In 1913 ground was broken for a combined church and school building. Construction also began on the rectory at 2953 Lowe. The church was dedicated on May 17, 1914. Possibly the only Filipek events here were Mary's funeral mass and her daughter's baptism, both in 1916. The church has now been closed.



James Filipek's home and first Grocery Store (1900-1902)	2956 S. Emerald	 2956 S. Emerald on the west side of Emerald. This is where the Filipeks settled in 1900 when they returned from Colorado. The bottom part where the store window and door was has been bricked up, but several features of the site, such as the upper bow window are the same. See photo in Filipek Photo Collection.
Liberty Hall	3000 Union Avenue	 This was the location of Lawrence Barrett's and Mary Filipek's wedding reception. Liberty Hall was directly in back of the Filipek grocery store on 30th Street. This location was seen on the July 7, 2001 Filipek Tour. The hall is gone and it a newer house now.
Comiskey Park	Between 34th and 35th between Wentworth and Shields	 The first Comiskey Park was about a mile walk from the Filipek Grocery Store though it was not there until 1910. The White Sox previous stadium, South Side Park was another half mile further. from the Filipeks. South Side Park was used by the White Sox from 1900 until 1910. It was on the north side of 39th Street (now called Pershing Road) between South Wentworth Avenue and South Princeton Avenue. I believe the Filipek boys went there regularly to see the White Sox. I know my grandfather, James Albert Filipek was a lifelong fan.





James A. Filipek Home (circa 1942 to about 1950)	8243 South May	This is where James and Grace lived during the war along with her daughter Jeanne, husband Ed and Dave after Ed's discharge. In 1947 mom, dad and Dave moved to 83rd Street.
James A. Filipek Home (circa 1921 to 1925 and again from circa 1951 to about 1963)	7047 South Ada	 This home was originally purchased by Adrianus Vanderkloot, father of Grace Vanderkloot about 1910. It was a two flat. James and Grace lived here just after they were married. Later James and Grace lived from about 1951 to shortly after James died in 1961 in the downstairs flat. Alette Schodrof, Grace's sister lived her for many years.

- 1. Riverside is bounded on the east by Harlem Avenue, 6400 West and and on the west by the Brookfield Zoo.
- 2. Riverside is bounded on the north by 26th Street and thus about 7 miles straight west of the old Filipek grocery store at 30th and Emerald in Chicago.
- 3. The DesPlaines River runs through Riverside.
- 4. The actual Filipek and Sokolik homes are not marked on the map. However, Olmsted, Burlington, and Addison streets are easily found on the map.
- 5. A rail line runs parallel to Burlington Street. This is the Northern Burlington line, today primarily a commuter line into the city. Perhaps Katherine Filipek, who lived on Burlington loved watching the trains, a memory of their days in Colorado.

Chicago Street Numbering Overview

The following information and table have been put together to help convert street names into street numbers and vice versa for some of the old Chicago neighborhoods my ancestors lived.

Overview of Chicago Street Characteristics

- 1. In Chicago there are normally 8 streets per mile.
- 2. The addressing system then numbers each street west of State Street as multiples of 100 West.
- 3. However, in more congested areas there can be as many as 16 streets per mile. This is the case for a couple of miles west of State. In the table below are shown sixteen streets for the mile between State and Halsted. All these streets run north-south.
- 4. Over the years a number of these streets were renamed and in some areas the streets may not exist anymore due to added rail lines, parks, expressways.
- 5. There are also 8 streets to the mile for streets running east-west.
- 6. State and Madison are address reference point zero-zero.
- 7. As an example south 24th Street is 3 miles south of Madison and south 32nd Street is four miles south of Madison.
- 8. In congested areas, additional streets called "Place" such as 24th Place may be added. 24th Place would be between 24th and 25th Streets.
- 9. Addresses on north-south streets with an odd numbered address such as 3001 S. Emerald, are on the east side of the north-south street. Addresses on east-west streets with odd numbers such as 187 24th Place are on the south side of the street.

City Directories

Following is background on various city directories which were used to compile many of the addresses for our families of interest.

Chicago Directories

The Chicago City Directories list individuals and businesses in Chicago from the years 1839 to 1917 with special Directory editions in 1923 and 1928-1929. These directories, though rather comprehensive, are sometimes incomplete as many times newer immigrants and boarding house roomers were missed. Listings for each individual include name, address and occupation and business names if proprietor. The data were generally collected in the closing months before the year of publication; thus the addresses were sometimes out-of-date by publication since the population was very mobile.

The Chicago Public Library and the Newberry Library have most of the Chicago Directories on microfilm. The New York Public Library also has a fairly complete collection of these directories in their original paper form. Microfilms of the Chicago Directories may also be borrowed from various locations on interlibrary loan.

Pueblo City Directories

The Pueblo City Directories list individuals and businesses in Pueblo, Colorado. The Pueblo Directories were searched from 1894-1900 and copies made of all pages where the Filipeks and Sokoliks would be listed.
